Robyn Vouden, 67, grew up in Balgowlah and Forestville, before embarking on her long career as an enrolled nurse at Royal North Shore Hospital aged 17.

In the early 1980s she became a registered nurse, all while bringing up three children.

She later joined Manly Hospital and became a Clinical Nurse Specialist educating many nurses in day surgery and endoscopic procedures.

In 2018, she was one of around 800 staff from Manly and Mona Vale hospitals that moved to Northern Beaches Hospital when it opened.

Ms Vouden played a pivotal role in the establishment of the endoscopy unit before the opening of the hospital. Today the hospital is a leader in the field of endoscopy.

Those staff who moved from public hospitals retained their continuous service and last week more than 60 staff received long service awards for their efforts.
